HISTORY & LOCATION

Established in 1847 among the glacial hills, lakes, and prairies of the Kettle Moraine, the City of Delafield offers residents and visitors a variety of natural attractions, historic sites, shopping and dining experiences. Community events are held year round including art fairs, outdoor theater, ice sculpting, and music festivals. Delafield has an area of about 11 square miles, located in central Waukesha County along Interstate Highway 94, which provides convenient access to surrounding communities.



EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

The City of Delafield is served by the Arrowhead Union High School District and the Kettle Moraine School District. with one elementary school located in the City. Both Districts offer innovative high school programs, including the two-building campus at Arrowhead, focusing on educational opportunities by grade level, and the collegiate-style career building campus (including three charter schools) at Kettle Moraine. Each of the high schools consistently exceeds expectations of statewide achievement. In addition, Delafield is served by a number of private schools and by the Delafield Public Library, which is a member of the Waukesha and Jefferson Counties Bridges Library System.

Numerous higher education opportunities are available to Delafield residents in Waukesha County and in neighboring counties. Carroll University, a private university, is located in the City of Waukesha. Cardinal Stritch, Herzing, and Ottawa Universities have campuses in Brookfield offering undergraduate and graduate programs. In addition, Waukesha County Technical College (WCTC) is located in Pewaukee and

offers associate degrees, technical diplomas, and short-term certificates. Milwaukee County is home to 15 universities, including UW-Milwaukee, Marquette University, and the Milwaukee School of Engineering. Together, these universities offer a wide variety of undergraduate and graduate programs.

GOVERNMENT

The City of Delafield is governed by a 7 member Common Council and Mayor, who is the presiding officer of the Common Council. Administrative responsibility is shared by the Mayor, elected administrative officials, boards, and appointed officials. The City's Community Development Department works with the business community to promote Delafield as a place to establish business development. The City Police Department has about 20 sworn and civilian employees. Lake Country Fire and Rescue serves 7 communities in the area with a staff of about 100 working out of 5 fire stations, including the headquarters in Delafield.

PARKS

There are about a dozen Cityowned park and open spaces in the City of Delafield, as well as Nagawaukee County Park and Lapham Peak in the Kettle Moraine State Forest. The parks provide a wide range of activities including lake access, baseball, golf, hiking and biking trails, and picnic shelters. The parks also protect unique natural resources and provide places for the community to gather.


